


How to Mend Broken Hearts

Instructions:


Students will mend "broken hearts" by explaining how someone could fix the situations on the left side of the hearts. On the right side, they write in a way that the mistake can be fixed. Students will need left hearts, right hearts, and a backer paper to glue down the heart halves together. I recommend printing the left hearts and the right hearts on different colors of paper. This is an activity I did with my 2nd graders to prepare for Penance, but it can be a non-religious activity for students to brainstorm fixing bad decisions or mistakes.

Someone lies about finishing their chores




