

Fifth Grade: Lesson 13

Anointing the Sick

Lesson Objective:

This lesson is an in-depth study of the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. Catechists should help children understand that human frailty is part of life and that our loving God is with us through this sacrament when our bodies and minds grow weak. Catechists should give concrete examples of when it is appropriate to receive this sacrament.

Learning Outcomes: Students will ...

- Explain anointing of the sick as a celebration of Christ's healing presence in our lives (CCC 1499, 1503).
- List and explain the signs and symbols of Anointing of the Sick (CCC 1513, 1518-1519, 1531).
- Relate some of the healing stories from the Bible to the Anointing of the Sick.
- Share some of the ways in today's world that Jesus continues to heal through the Anointing of the Sick.

Materials Needed:

- Prayer space items, Bible, pencils, crayons or colored pencils
- Copies: Signs, Symbols, Key Points handout, Anointing of the Sick response, Healing Stories from the Bible

As Students Enter Class:

- Have a copy of Signs, Symbols, and Key Points from this lesson for each student to review as they wait for class to begin.

Beginning of Class:

- Gather around your prayer space and recite a traditional Catholic prayer.
- Ask students to share their thoughts about the handout they were reading over as they waited for class to begin. Make sure they understand that Anointing of the Sick is another Sacrament, given to us by Jesus, in which we share this free grace.

Lesson Order	Implementation Ideas
Lesson 13 Video	<p>This video is 2:24 in length.</p> <p>Highlights: This is the second part in our study of the Sacraments of Healing. Last week we explored the Sacrament of Reconciliation and today, we spend our time learning about the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. This is a celebration of Christ's healing presence in our lives.</p> <p>The Bible shares many examples of Jesus providing healing. Jesus wants to share His healing powers with us today. This sacrament will restore God's strength and grace to all who receive it.</p> <p>Read: James 5:13-15</p> <p>Is anyone among you suffering? He should pray. Is anyone in good spirits? He should sing praise.</p> <p>14: Is anyone among you sick? * He should summon the presbyters of the church, and they should pray over him and anoint [him] with oil in the name of the Lord,</p> <p>15 and the prayer of faith will save the sick person, and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven. *</p> <p>The Church has been performing Anointing of the Sick since the beginning. The priest uses a special oil called the Oil of the Sick. Sometimes receiving this sacrament helps heal the illness. If not, it helps prepare the person for their journey to the Lord in Heaven.</p> <p>DISCUSSION: Provide some scenarios of when someone would receive this sacrament and when they wouldn't. Encourage students to give a thumbs up for yes and thumbs down for no.</p> <p>Examples:</p>

	<p>You are sick with a cold. Would you call a priest to receive this sacrament? (No)</p> <p>Your grandmother is going to the hospital for heart surgery. Would you call a priest to receive this sacrament? (Yes).</p> <p>Your grandfather fell and hurt his ankle. Would you call a priest to receive this sacrament? (No).</p> <p>You have a cousin who has cancer. They are in the hospital because he/she is weak and struggling. Would you call a priest to receive this sacrament? (Yes).</p>

<p>Anointing of the Sick: Who It's For</p>	<p>This Busted Halo video is 6:29 in length and is very well done.</p> <p>Highlights: Remember, sacraments are only celebrated by living people, not people who have already passed away. When to receive Anointing of the Sick:


- 1) Before surgery or a serious procedure
- 2) During a long-term or terminal illness
- 3) Experiencing health issues related to old age.

Signs, Symbols, and Key Points	This is a handout you may have used at the beginning of class. If not, use it now and give students a few minutes to look over the information presented. Hold a discussion to answer any questions or observations students have made.
Anointing of the Sick Response	Encourage students to reflect on their learning and to draw and write their responses in their neatest work. If applicable, please post on a bulletin board.

Healing Stories from the Bible and Today	Depending on your time, you can pair students up and assign one passage to each pair. Then come back as a class and each pair of students shares their responses.
Closing Prayer	Consider modeling a prayer of Thanksgiving to God for all the beautiful Sacraments we have been blessed to receive.
